[Flood Ready Vermont](#) provides the best available information on municipal actions that qualify toward ERAF.

Here is how the data are managed:

1. [National Flood Insurance Program \(NFIP\)](#) status is managed by the [NFIP Coordinators' office](#) at VT DEC/Rivers to reflect [communities that participate in the NFIP](#) or have sent an application to FEMA.
2. [Municipal Road and Bridge Standards](#) information are managed by the VTrans District Project Managers. The report itself includes an email link for the District Project Manager. Each year VTrans District Project Managers work with Select Boards to update a number of documents using the most current forms and standards. The documents are sometimes modified by municipal officials and the VTrans District Project Managers must evaluate the documents to confirm their quality. The Managers record the documents in a spreadsheet and then later the spreadsheet and the scanned documents are posted to the RoadsInfo/ FloodReady Database. If a document is missing from the ERAF Summary Sheet, Municipal Road and Bridge Standards Summary Report or the Expanded Community Report please click on the link in the report to contact your VTrans District Project Manager directly.
3. [Local Emergency Operations Plan \(LEOP\)](#) These data are managed by [DEMHS](#) using the Flood Ready database. Please note that the LEOP is an annual plan due after Town Meeting and before May 1.
4. [Local Hazard Mitigation Plan \(LHMP\)](#) These data are managed by [DEMHS](#) using the Flood Ready database. LHMP are valid for five years from the date of FEMA final approval. Communities that have submitted a plan for review are considered to have met the LHMP criterion for ERAF.
5. [River Corridor Protection](#) These data are managed by the [NFIP Coordinators' office](#) at VTDEC/Rivers using the Flood Ready database.
